Every other year FOCA awards unrestricted grants to mid career artists in recognition of their contributions to and impacts on California art.




Every other year curators are invited to submit exhibition proposals. These proposals are carefully reviewed by the Long Range Planning Committee, and a few are selected to make onsite presentations. The winning proposal is given the Curators Exhibition Award to realize and present the exhibition.




The Curators Lab Exhibition greatly enhances FOCA's goals by reaching out to and funding young curators who will present exhibitions in support of a curatorial thesis.








ABELES, A bel eez, KIM (1952—), born Kim Victoria Wright in Richmond Heights, Missouri to Frances Elizabeth (Sander) (Wright) (Schoemaker) Hoffman and Burton Noel Wright. Her mother, a singer in the St. Louis Municipal Opera, later becomes a visual artist. Her father (1919-1990) worked as a sales manager in the firebrick industry in St. Louis, Missouri. Her only sibling, Jill Wright, is an accomplished illustrator. Following her mother's second marriage in 1960, she is raised in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She expresses a strong sense of artmaking early in life. In her early teens, she travels to conferences on civil issues as a representative for the local YWCA.

Chronology. 1969. Selected as American Field Service student to Utsunomiya, Japan. Abeles meets Buddhist priest, Kōsai Kobari, who introduces her to traditional Japanese arts: calligraphy, woodcut printing, ceramics, and kimono-making.

1970. Studies painting at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio and receives BFA in 1974. Her artwork is published for the first time in 1972 in *Seventeen* magazine.


1973. Lives in converted grain silo in rural southeastern Ohio with first husband, Ken Abeles. Writes and illustrates the book, *Crafts, Cookery and Country Living*, published by Van Nostrand Reinhold Co., New York in 1976. Begins exhibiting *trompe l'oeil* paintings with personal/psychological themes.



Frankenstein's Heart and Smog Collection, collage and drawing, Encyclopedia Persona, 1993










- C: Off Jones Valley Road. 9 miles from Hiway 299 leading from Redding. On Bank of finger of Shasta Lake. Materials: found logs.
- A: On road to Paradise. 7 miles from intersection of Paradise Road and Hiway 99 (near Chico). Materials: paint on rock.
- L: 3.6 miles from Newcastle on California 193. Materials: telephone pole and faked shadow.
- 5 miles from San Andreas on Hiway
 49. Near Angel's Camp.
 Materials: non-toxic color in creek.
- F: Ben Hur Road. South of Mariposa. 3.4 miles from California 49. Materials: scattered bits of red cloth.
- O: 3.4 miles on Reed Road from junction 180. Near Minkler. Materials: red yarn.
- R: 14 miles north of Kernville in Sequoia National Forest. In Kern River.
 - Materials: found rocks.
- N: 4.1 miles from Hiway 395 on Death Valley Road. 6 miles on south side of road. Materials: rocks and dry color.
- I: Outside Lucerne: 11.8 miles from Lucerne fire station. 2 miles off Old Womans Spring Road. Turn at sign reading Partin Limestone Products. Materials: white dry color (the letter is nearly invisible).
- A: In Joshua Tree National
 Monument. 15 miles from TwentyNine Palms Visitors Center on road
 to Cottonwood.
 Materials: dry color, rocks, desert
 wildflower seed.




